Sustainability Planning Framework



Sustainability





- Sustaining a program is not simply decreasing dependence on one source of funding and shifting financial support for program implementation to new funding sources. The process of sustaining a program is a much more intricate and dynamic process¹.
- Your data must support your sustainability plan to demonstrate program effectiveness; tell your story; diversify your funding sources; attract new partners to form new partnerships and increase investments.
- Your data will help you define which of your practices, activities, key positions should be sustained.
- Your data will tell you and your partners who benefits most from your program. "Those
 who benefit the most should pay the most."

Keep In Mind



- Know the difference between sustaining your program and securing match funds (different approaches)
- Collaborate with fund development experts and become an expert yourself
- Learn to tell your story better
- Identify new partners and sources of funding
- Don't look for money; look for partners
- Think long-term
- Expand the scope of your project to address the partners' needs; ex: lack of diversity in STEM workforce
- Expand your definition of financial support to include technology, expertise, materials, space, personnel, etc.
- Don't approach the process as a stressful endeavor; learn to enjoy this work; it feels good to sustain good work and good programs; it's fun ☺.
