- Goal: Create sustainable teacher residency programs that prepare highquality licensed educators, including teachers from underrepresented communities, in high needs areas to increase student achievement.
- Partners: Charter School Consortium and Minneapolis Public Schools
 - 20 residents/year for Charter schools
 - 15 residents/year for MPS
 - License Area: Academic Behavior Strategies and/or Elementary Education based on local needs assessment
- Professional Development Activities: Mentors and Graduates
 - Induction Support & Affinity Groups
 - Annual Teacher Pathways Summit
 - Leadership Academy
 - Ongoing professional development through ASD/EBD Summer Institute and Microcredential digital badges



We didn't start from scratch

- To date, prepared 261 residents, currently interviewing for an additional 50 residents to begin June 2022;
- Over the 12 cohorts 60% identify as BIPOC
- First residency cohort, June 2016 with SPPS and have continued each year since (starting 7th cohort);
- MPS started June 2017 and continued each year (starting 6th cohort)
- Charter started June 2021; starting second cohort
- Ongoing member of NCTR network
